

INTRODUCTION



RESULT AND DISCUSSION



Interviewee 1


Nur Azizah

I also asked some friends of Mrs. Nur Azizah's friends and their answers were the same



Interviewee 2


Iqbal

I'm also a bit long-winded in asking for responses from this second interviewee, but we summarized the answers as neatly as possible.


Interviewee 3


"In this regard, every member, cadre, and sympathizer of the party is obliged to go down and strengthen the grassroots, communicate directly with the people, and be assisted by the use of information and communication technology, which is why yesterday was conveyed about the use of artificial intelligence," said Hasto.

and Megawati also spoke about her meeting with other PDI Party members.

"This morning I read Kompas, the Rakernas will determine the attitude, blah, blah. I was having breakfast. I said it's good, I'll play it first!" Megawati said. And Megawati also had time to answer questions about







what about members who are not active or just relaxing. "I have already said, I want this party to be a pioneer party. Those of you who don't work for the people, get out!" said Megawati.

He also threatened the leaders of every PDIP organization who did not want to go down to the community with dismissal. He invited every PDIP cadre to make a report if they found PDIP leaders at the DPC to DPP level who did not want to go down to the bottom. "What exists is to be served by your people," he said.

At the end, Megawati asked her cadres not to be afraid to speak the truth. According to her, fear is just an illusion that disturbs the mind. "Because fear is just an illusion and we are free human beings," he concluded.

Positive and Negative Impacts on Political Legitimacy

The public's view of the PDI's victory can affect the party's political legitimacy. If the majority of people feel that the victory was fair and reasonable, it can strengthen the legitimacy of the PDI as a representation of the people's will. However, if there is widespread dissatisfaction or suspicion, it could undermine the legitimacy of the party and the authority of the government. PDI's victory has had a complex impact on Indonesian politics and society. While there are positive impacts such as policy continuity and strengthening democracy, we must also be mindful of negative impacts such as political dominance and social polarization. Building a healthy political system requires a balance between sufficient power to govern effectively and the protection of minority rights and freedom of speech.


CONCLUSION


